A COMMUNITY ENDING HUNGER

THE END HUNGER WAREHOUSE: SERVING SOUTHERN MARYLAND FAMILIES FOR GENERATIONS TO COME

The much-anticipated completion of the food distribution space on the first floor of the End Hunger Warehouse is expected to be fully operational in 2024. Thanks to you, the new space will ensure that End Hunger will continue to serve as a Redistribution Organization for The Maryland Food Bank in Southern Maryland.

The second floor will provide a home for The Culinary Program of End Hunger. The third floor will serve as a resource center for other nonprofits, have collaborative meeting spaces available for community use, and a terrace for outdoor events, catering supported by The Culinary Program.

Following the completion of the first floor of the building, construction will begin for the second and third floors. The project has moved forward steadily with the support of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development as part of multiple awards totaling \$2,498,000 in federal funds. These funds account for 27 percent of the total project, with the other 73 percent financed from non-governmental sources.

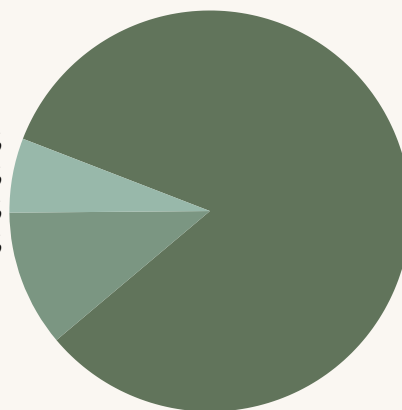
